Holy Night, Refracted Light... by Pastor Gina

In 1672, Isaac Newton wrote a paper detailing his experiment of shining light through a prism. He noted that when white light is shown through a prism, light bends and reveals seven different colors – the colors of the rainbow. This ground-breaking discovery of bending light is what we call "refraction." It is because of refraction that we see color (including rainbows!), can comprehend distance, and have lenses and magnifying glasses to help us see more clearly. In addition to light, sound, water, and air all can be refracted, all of which help to create our understanding and perception of the world in which we live.

In John 1:1-5 says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was with God in the beginning. ³Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

This passage is one that is often read during Advent and the Christmas season. We read it at this time of the church year because it reminds us that out of God's great love for us, God, who is the creator of the universe, chose to come to earth in the form of a tiny baby, born in humble means, to a low income family. And according to the author of the gospel of John, this baby, Jesus, is the light of the world, the light that shines in the darkness. Amidst the fears, hatred, and horrors that afflict this world, Jesus is still here among us, shining that light.

However, that's not always easy to see. It's difficult to see and grasp Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, in a broken world. What does God's presence even look like today? Where do we even start looking?

Pastor's Letter (continued)

Christians often talk about how we are called to reflect Jesus' light, as though Jesus' light comes from somewhere else far away, and bounces off of us somehow in random directions. This gives the image that we are simply called to quote scripture, publicly do good works to show God is working through us, and publicly pray for people's salvation in order to reflect the light of Christ.

However, I wonder if it would be more accurate to give the image of refracting God's light to the world, to allow God's story and the light and understanding of Jesus to bend in different ways, allowing different views of God, different experiences, different cultures – the many colors of the world that we so often ignore or don't see – to influence our faith and life, and help us grow in new ways that allow God's light to not only shine in the world but bend to help us view the world differently. After all, wasn't that part of what that "holy night" in Bethlehem, as well as Jesus entire ministry and life, was all about? Changing the way we understood and perceived how God worked (and still works) in the world today? I pray that throughout this season of Advent and Christmas, you are able to not only find God and feel God's presence, but also be surprised by the refracted light shone through you and many others in the world today.

Youth Leadership Summit Reflection

The ELCA Youth Leadership Summit empowers and inspires young people within their congregations, communities, and synods to embrace their calling and become influential leaders beyond their current context. This year's theme, "Called on The Way" focuses on exploring the unique journeys that individuals take in response to their calling and how these journeys shape their leadership abilities through Biblical narratives and alongside our many ELCA advocacy partners. Each synod is invited to send two youth leaders (in grades 9-12) and one adult to the ELCA Youth Leadership Summit. This year Zander Cole, Benny Williams, and Becky Cole attended the Youth Leadership Summit, which was held in Chicago. While only there Thursday through Sunday, there was much learning, laughter, and growing from the youth and the adults. Here are their reflections:

I'm a person who loves going to youth group and loves the community around it. When I was asked to co-represent my youth group at this Summit, I was very excited at the opportunity. While there, not only did I get to experience it with my friend Zander, I got to meet some great new people. They assigned us into "family groups," and our group developed a special bond, and we continue to be in touch. We compared notes about youth involvement at our churches and given our great youth program at our church, I was surprised to learn that many of the other kids' churches did not have very active youth programs. Given this common issue, I think it was a goal of the Summit to inspire youth to be active leaders in their communities. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to learn some new leadership skills and would highly recommend this Summit to any youth who is offered the opportunity to go in the future. – Benny

I would like to thank Becky Cole and Benny Williams for going to the ELCA Youth Leadership Summit with me. Over a few days, I learned about other churches experience inside the ELCA, especially with our youth. The people that help organized and the people that went, I believe, have the same goal for our future in our churches, though I slightly disagree with the message. I continue to do the work of God and would like to work with ELCA in the future. We talked about how we can help people stay and feel welcome to join our church. Inside that discussion, we also talked about more acceptance for our youth, this includes the guidance of a personal connection with God and where youth can at least meet once. The Summit is a place where youth feel like they are represented and learned how to build community through all ages. Thank you. – Zander

The Youth Leadership Summit was a great gathering of youth from across the country, along with a leader from each synod. The Youth Core Leadership Team did a great job of planning this event and it included speakers from lots of different perspectives, along with time to get to know others, and then reflect on where we are in the world today with a Candlelight time. Bishop Curry welcomed us in our opening worship and had a wonderful message of inclusivity. The youth attended 3 workshops throughout the weekend related to Advocacy, Transitioning from Youth to Young Adult, Listening to Others and Ourselves, and more. While the youth were in workshops, the adults had their own track where they learned more about the ELCA Youth Gathering (Listening to our Youth), and sharing our experiences with each other. We also met in our region for part of our adult track and it was great to meet others from our region. The youth played "Glow in the Dark Hide and Seek" one evening in the Lutheran Center and even got to hide in Bishop Eaton's office – not many youth can say that! Our closing worship was uplifting and sent all of us out to share the inclusive love of Christ. It was a blessing to represent the synod and HSLC at this event. – Becky

At our last meeting, the library committee was discussing criteria for new books for the library. One suggestion we all liked was that the book should draw the reader to reflect. What kind of books meet this requirement? It isn't as simple as just picking certain genres and avoiding others.

For example, a good novel can elicit new thoughts and feelings about oneself, the world, human nature, God, etc. It can introduce you to cultures and situations that you have never faced in your own life, and in the process teach you something new. Or it can just be written so well that you see a familiar situation in a new way.

On the other hand, a novel can be just a lot of fun – pure entertainment; not a lot of reflection involved. And that is OK, too! Many of us love to read just for fun. However, as best we can, we would like to make choices for the Holy Spirit library which go beyond entertainment alone. Something similar can be said of non-fiction genres.

Social Justice: Housing & Homelessness from Jack Staudt

I often share news and the great works on our local Kirkland homelessness charities, supported by your generous financial support to the HSLC budget and the Social Justice fund. This month, I will share a new name and partner in the continuum of homeless care on the Eastside - *PorchLight*.

Congregations for the Homeless (CFH) is pleased to announce they are transitioning to a new name: *PorchLight*.

Since October 1993, when CFH welcomed its first guest, the name "Congregations for the Homeless" has served them well. But perceptions and attitudes about homelessness and social services have evolved in the past three decades, and so has CFH. With the opening of their new shelter in its permanent location, they feel that the timing is right to refresh their brand and showcase their evolved continuum of care.

The name *PorchLight* embodies the guiding principles and values underpinning their work from the beginning: Relationships, Dignity and Respect, Community, and Empowerment. Just as a porch light provides a beacon of hope and warmth, this organization provides a guiding light for those in need, offering a safe space, support, and a sense of belonging to individuals experiencing homelessness.

This is the first permanent home facility dedicated to homeless men on the Eastside. And as with many other shelter organizations, started by faith-based congregations seeing the need and advocating over many years to make this happen. They overcame the "not-in-my-backyard" culture in suburban neighborhoods, the bureaucracy of building codes, and the challenging Covid barriers to raise millions from churches and corporate supporters.

Now it is our turn to help sustain this work. *PorchLight* has been added to our Social Justice giving list, and you can help. Send a donation to HSLC and just note it is for "homelessness", or *PorchLight* specifically.
