Cultivating Community

Jesus said, 'What is the kingdom of God like, and to what should I compare it? It is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in the garden; it grew and became a tree, and the birds of the air made nests in its branches.'

- Luke 13:18-19

It's the time of year when I have seeds on the brain. As far as the garden is concerned, all things are possible right now! We might end up with gorgeous, ripe tomatoes; tall, sturdy sunflowers; sweet green beans; wispy, delicate cosmos; crunchy, earthy carrots.

Or we might end up with slug-eaten leaves, tomato rot, carrots stubbier than my thumb, sunflowers that get so top-heavy they break in the night, and green beans devoured by bunnies. That's all possible too.

What will make the difference? Some factors we can't control: sunshine, rain, temperature, wind. No matter how hard you work, there are some sources of fortune and misfortune in gardening that will have their way with your crops. Not every seed will blossom into beauty.

But cultivating does make a difference. Working fertilizer into the soil; digging up the old roots; spacing out the seeds so they have room to grow; watering regularly; all of those seemingly small, often daily tasks will add up over time. (I have no recommendations on the bunny problem. Let me know if you do.)

Jesus often uses agricultural images to talk about the kingdom of God – the way God works in the world. In his day and time, many of the folks he spoke to likely spent a lot of time in the dirt, trying to cultivate small crops they could live on and share with neighbors. And so he spoke in ideas they could relate to: seeds, sowing, wheat, weeds, fig trees, and birds of the air.

During the month of May, as a community we take time to think and talk about stewardship: that is, how we use our resources of time, finances, and ability to nurture the kingdom of God through Holy Spirit Lutheran Church. This year, our theme is *Cultivating Community*.

But there are things we can do in the garden of this community. We can nurture the seeds of faith by supporting faith in our young children and families, just beginning on new adventures. We can fertilize the roots of community by paying attention to one another, praying for each other, and calling someone just to check in.

We can branch out in love for our community by imagining new ways to support those who are experiencing homelessness, keep our new Community Pantry filled and ready, and welcome new refugees among us. We can push ourselves to be better gardeners by reaching toward solar panels, electric car charging stations, and a smaller carbon footprint for our building.

- *The End of Drum-Time* by Hanna Pylvainen Romance, religion, and class in nineteenth-century Lapland.
- Absolution by Alice McDermott American wives in war-time Saigon search for meaning.
- Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese A long book following multiple generations
 of a family in India, and in the process teaching the reader about changes in India and in
 medicine.
- The Berry Pickers by Amanda Peters The mysterious disappearance of a child turns a light on both family dynamics and racism.
- Exit West by Mohsin Hamid A slightly fantastical account of a young couple forced to flee their homeland.
