Without a doubt, the highlight of our family's summer was the Taylor Swift concert at Lumen Field on Saturday, July 22nd.

(Before you wonder too much, we lucked into tickets when they went on sale through the determination and good fortune of my brother, who is our family's Secret Sauce when it comes to ticket procurement. Our seats weren't fantastic, but they weren't terribly expensive and hey – we were in the stadium! That's all we needed.)

If Taylor Swift isn't your jam, just know that she has spent the summer on her "Eras" Tour, crossing the United States selling out stadiums, causing traffic jams, emptying bead stores of supplies (more on that later), and even causing an earthquake during the Seattle concert. She's sold an estimated 114 million albums worldwide, and her fans are well-known for a nearly unprecedented level of devotion. She is, in short, a phenomenon. And her shows are an experience.

We left home at 2:00 pm to catch the train from Edmonds to Seattle, not only because Taylor Swift alone would cause traffic problems, but because that also happened to be a weekend that included Mariners games, the closure of 520, and multiple other construction projects. By the time we arrived home and climbed into bed, it was 2:00 am the next day. Worth it? Absolutely.

I happen to live with a devoted Swiftie, our 12-year old daughter. So I knew many of the songs, and I felt like I had a reasonable handle on lyrics. We all had special outfits to wear, as did every fan in attendance that night: many inspired by songs or albums, lyrics or words, imagery or phrases throughout Taylor's music.

But I turned out to be a complete neophyte when it came to Taylor Swift Fandom. All around us, for the whole 3 ½ hours she sang (yep, you read that correctly), every person there sang with every single lyric. The moment a new song started, the screams and cheers erupted in recognition. Certain phrases were shouted with joy and laughter; I thought it was an accomplishment to sing along with "Shake It Off," but I was totally out of my element. I was surrounded by Professional Swifties. And it was fantastic.

Pastor's Letter (continued)

Since then, I've read a few articles comparing Taylor Swift concerts to church. There was something religious about the experience – about 72,000+ fans singing, dancing, bound together by a mutually transcendent experience with total strangers. Could we learn something from Taylor? Here are some possibilities:

Community Matters. Being at a Taylor Swift concert is not an individual experience; it's intentionally communal. There are rituals involved, including trading beaded bracelets inspired by song and lyrics – so many bracelets that local bead stores regularly sell out before Taylor arrives in town. Whatever differences concert-goers have pale in comparison to being part of the community created in the stadium that night.

Everybody's Voice Matters. None of us in the stadium that night could sing like Taylor. And often, at a concert, I find myself irritated when others sing along with the professional – I'm here for them, I think, not for you! But in this case, a huge part of the experience was singing, at the top of our untalented lungs, without a care about performance or perfection. Just sing! Don't know the words? Forgot the lyrics? Never heard this one before? Who cares! Every voice belongs.

Joy Matters. "You're going to have to deal with my emotions," Swift said to all of us, "and if you haven't heard, I have...a lot of them." She's well-known for writing lyrics that reflect sadness, heartbreak, anger, and revenge. But she also sings about hope, life, joy, humor, even justice (just check out one of my favorites, "You Need to Calm Down"). And the experience of singing all those emotions together is a freedom, a form of joy. Just broke up with someone? Not sure about your self-image? Mad about a friend's betrayal? Up for a night out dancing? There's a song for that. Sing it. Enjoy it. And find someone else to sing with. Life can be hard, and we need joy like we need air, and water, and food.

As fall programming gets going at Holy Spirit, I hope you'll join us for community, for music, for joy – because your voice matters.

Let's make the whole place shimmer. See you soon!

Common Hope "Walk for Hope" Sunday, September 24th | 10:30 am

Common Hope is an organization working in Guatemala to end generational poverty through a model that utilizes education as a solution. Each year Common Hope sponsors a walk to raise funds. We have chosen Sunday morning, September 24 to support Common Hope. All participants are invited to join us for a combination social gathering and fundraiser for Common Hope. Participation in the fundraiser is not a requirement to participate. The walk will start and end at HSLC. Routes will be identified to Juanita Beach and Juanita Bay. The routes are 1.5 and 3 miles long respectively.

Participants are encouraged to socialize before and after the walk. Following the walk, a complimentary light lunch will be available, and everyone is encouraged to gather for conversation. This year's "Walk For Hope" will raise funds and awareness for critical services such as preventative health screenings, dental clinics, and wellness education so that students can stay in school and earn their diploma! 
Mom's Midweek Ministry Thursdays | 9:45 am, starting September 14th

2023 Middle School Week of Service Update

During the week of July 24, 15 Middle School youth gathered at the church to do some service projects. Here is an update of what we accomplished during that week.

- We packed over 1300 meals through Children of the Nations, which will be shipped to Sierra Leone, where the poverty level is extreme.
- We gathered hundreds of pounds of food for our one-day free pantry that was held at
 the church that Friday. We worked with Nourishing Network to get the work out to the
 broader community about our pantry. Some of the food we gathered made its way to
 many places in our community, including the Veteran Center, Safe Parking Program
 at the Rose Hill United Methodist Church, Plateful (aplatefull.org), the pink pantry
 behind the church, and many other places.
- We are very thankful for the donations that helped make the food pantry and the
 week of service happen. The food for the pantry came from generous donations made
 by the congregation, some came from grants from Thrivent, and Corporate Matching
 Funds. Some of the funds also came from the families of the youth who participated in
 the week of service.
- We built part of a tiny house. Building a tiny house takes more than a week to complete, so other volunteers stepped in to help finish the tiny house.

A huge thank you goes to the Social Justice Committee, whose very generous support was key in buying the supplies to make the tiny house project happen. I want to thank everyone who helped with the projects during our week of service, and I am so blessed to be a part of a congregation who fully supports the youth and family programs and our efforts to provide this kind of large-scale service to the community. You are an incredible example to our youth.

*Tiny house update: The tiny house was delivered to Seattle, where it will find its way to one of the tiny house villages. LiHi (Low Income Housing Institute) is planning two new tiny house villages to open by the end of this year. It is awesome to know that our tiny house will make a home for someone who needs it.

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Social Justice - Homelessness

Homelessness is not going away. Inflation in housing costs, job losses and illness during Covid exacerbated the problem. Federal funds helped many people stay in their homes, but now those eviction moratoriums and rent support programs are limited, and new state programs are just beginning to cope with the increasing numbers of homeless people of all ages.

What if you had a good life, including a college education, a professional career, a long happy marriage, but then your spouse got sick? You retire and care for them, years go by and health care bills mount, and they pass away leaving you in debt. Even with a pension and Social Security, escalating rent becomes a burden, and then you get sick, more hospital bills, and you can't pay the rent... This is a real story of a 75-year-old woman who becomes homeless in our community. Where could she start to look for help? There are many other stories of good people living normal lives and then an unexpected crisis leads to homelessness.

If you have outlived family and friends and are alone, you put your belongings in storage, and maybe sleep in your car a few nights to wonder where to go from here. Perhaps you hear about a church that will let you park safely overnight in their lot. And they offer toileting options, meals, and someone who helps you connect with other resources. In Kirkland, that would be the Lake Washington United Methodist Church Safe Parking program. The next step might be a referral to Sophia Way - Helen's Place Shelter for Women at Salt House Church.

Or, if you were a parent with children, you might be referred to the New Bethlehem Shelter, in the same building, located on former Salt House property. Both shelters would offer caring counseling to get you on a plan to again be housed and becoming independent again. As a family, you would be referred to Attain Housing. They will help you with transitional housing (six months to a year) and much more. Their staff refers clients to needed services, homeless prevention resources, and ultimately assists them in securing permanent housing. The last step might be Imagine Housing, who can assist you in gaining a permanent apartment of your own with subsidized rent, in one of their four buildings in Kirkland.

This is the faith-based continuum of care for the homeless in Kirkland. You support these five ministries with your gifts to the General Fund, as well as donations to the "Ministry in the World" fund at Holy Spirit Lutheran Church. There are of course many other agencies and resources in our county and Eastside cities. But these all began or are supported by faith-based groups and have served our community for many years.

HSLC Library Q&A

Q: What is the easiest way for me to find a book to read?

Three, come downstairs to the library itself and turn to your left. Books (usually newer acquisitions) are displayed on the counter by the windows and in the windows themselves, facing outwards. All displayed books are available to check out. (Yes, even the ones in the windows!)



A: As long as you need to finish it. After 30 days, you may get a call from a library volunteer to make sure the book is still being read and not just forgotten. (We all do it!)

Q: When is the library open?

A: Trick question! The library is always open. Sometimes the lights are turned off, which doesn't seem as welcoming, but you are ALWAYS welcome to come in and turn the lights on yourself. The switches are to your right as you come in the door.
